The Tini Tinou Festival 9th edition

Following the success of the 2014 revival of the Tini Tinou Cambodian Circus Festival, Phare Performing Social Enterprise and Phare Ponleu Selpak once again joined forces to organize the ninth edition of the festival. In 2015 the idea was to return to the festival's multicultural and international roots.

Over two weeks in May the festival visited Phnom Penh, Siem Reap and Battambang, giving audiences the chance to see a variety of world class circus performances.



The 2014 edition featured two troupes of Cambodian performers: Phare, The Cambodian Circus and the National Circus School of Cambodia.

The 2015 edition welcomed four international troupes and two Cambodian troupes.



Nights Under The Big Top

Each night the show was two hours long, divided into two sections with a 20-minute intermission. :

• The first section featured short (15 to 20 minute) performances. Between the acrobatics of the National Circus School, the mesmerizing dance of les Papillons, the funny magic tricks of Heritage Social Ho Chi Minh City and an explosive show from Formosa Circus Arts, there was no time to rest!



- The second section was a one-hour performance by either:
 - Phare, The Cambodian Circus, with their unique mix of theatre, story and modern circus art. The show performed by the artists of Phare changed from city to city: 4 shows were performed in total, involving roughly 50 artists.
 - O Ultimo Momento, a French troupe sponsored by the French Institute of Cambodia. They performed for two nights « Ce qui reste », a mesmerizing and moving show, revolving around the use of twin chinese poles.





An Inspiration for the Community

The Tini Tinou International Circus Festival is a unique opportunity for the Cambodian community to experience world-class circus shows.

In Cambodia, where access to art is severly limited, this event gives people the chance to enjoy and be astonished by circus acts they had never seen before.

The generous support of the sponsors allowed Phare to pursue its goal: to amaze and inspire. By donating 500 tickets to children from local NGOs and disadvantaged members of the community, we were able to reach an audience who otherwise may have never been able to go to the circus.

More than 500 tickets were set aside each night in all three cities, allowing the staff and partners of sponsors to witness first-hand what we were able to create with their generous support.

Sponsors were also honored with a certificate of appreciation delivered directly on stage by the Minister of Culture of Fine Arts.

Many side events were organized in each of the three cities, pulling new audiences into the wonderful atmosphere of the festival. There were street parades in Siem Reap and Battambang, two mini shows at the French Institute of Phnom Penh and one mini show at the Phnom Penh Airport.

Tini Tinou in Phnom Penh

Of the 1030 seats available each night, 700 were filled the first night, and the remaining two were sold out.

The audience was comprised of expats, middle-class Cambodians and children from local NGOs.

In Phnom Penh, we donated tickets to 325 children and students from local NGOs.



Two mini-shows were performed in Phnom Penh. One took place at the French Institute of Phnom Penh and included artists from Phare, Formosa Circus Arts of Taiwan and les Papillons of Switzerland. The second show took place at the Phnom Penh Airport and included artists from Phare.

During the festival, Phnom Penh Big Top was also a place where friendships were built and skills passed: Three artist-led workshops took place at the National Circus School of Cambodia, led by the troupes from Taiwan, Phare and Swtizerland.

Tini Tinou in Siem Reap

The Siem Reap big top, usually dedicated to daily Phare performances, welcomed the festival for three days. Each of its 330 seats were filled each night, allowing audiences of expats, last-minute tourists and community organization members to see the shows.

Despite having fewer seats to donate, 109 children and students from local NGOs were invited free of charge.





A street parade was organized in Siem Reap on May 11th, starting from the Shinta Mani Resort, winding through the Old Market and Pub Street and ending at the Phare, The Cambodian Circus big top. The parade featured short, spontaneous performances by each troupe as well as live music, balloons, umbrellas, stilt walkers, unicyclers and more. It was a colouful, lively way for the community to enjoy the festival and an effective way to promote the event.

Two artist-led workshops took place at the Phare big top. The first was led by the artists from Taiwan and the second by artists from Switzerland.

The final festival stop was Battambang, at Phare Ponleu Selpak. The 250-seat big top was packed each night.

Here the festival had the chance to engage more with community organizations. Many members of local NGOs, the families of artists and members of the local community were given free tickets.

The festival also provided the opportunity for the students of Phare Ponleu Selpak to

premiere their new creation, 'Puppets'. The show was presented on the final day of the festival to a sold out crowd.

In Battambang 70 tickets were donated to local children and to NGOs.





Thanks to the enthusiasm of the Phare Ponleu Selpak students and the international troupes, the Battambang parade was the biggest festival side event. It included an ecstatic crowd of clowns, jugglers and acrobats who paraded through the city for more than two and a half hours, which included an hour-long outdoor performance!

One workshop was organized in Battambang with the troupe from Taiwan and the students of Phare Ponleu Selpak, allowing the more experienced artists to share their skills with their younger, but very motivated, counterparts.

















Media Relations, Marketing and Communications

A press conference in Phnom Penh took place two months prior to the event, announcing the event to local and international media.

Following this, Phare reached out to individual members of the media to pitch specific stories. A wide range of communication materials were created for the festival.

Phare used both social media and traditional marketing to promote the festival. Over the two weeks of the festival, some street marketing strategies were also used, as we distributed flyers at popular tourist spots and during the parades.



- Flyer distribution in key tourist and expat hotspots.
- Posters in key places in Phnom Penh, Siem Reap, and Battambang, and in our three sales points in Phnom Penh, in partnership with Lotus Blanc Restaurant, Romeet Gallery and Carnets d'Asie Library.
- · Tuk tuk boards advertising
- Banners in the streets
- A press release in Khmer and English, followed by a more detailed press kit in English
- Journalists were given free access to the festival, both before and during the shows. They were accompanied on site by members of staff who could recommend and guide them to interviewees and particular story angles.
- Phare website, blog and social media channels, which posted multiple daily updates.
- Specially designed T-shirt were worn by staff and volunteers, as well as available for sale after performances.
- Sponsors communication material was also displayed in the big top. It was also possible for Gold sponsors to display their own marketing materials.
